Topics included the apparent suicide of former Enron vice chairman John Clifford Baxter, how it has affected the investigation into Enron, why former lead auditor David Duncan pleaded the fifth amendment to all questions by the Congressional panel, how Arthur Andersen LLP is involved, how the situation with Enron will affect the upcoming campaign finance reform bill, how this has affected the Bush administration, the likeliness of pulling Enron or any portion of it out of bankruptcy, how banks may be affected by the Enron bankruptcy, the future of the U.S. economy as a result of Enron's financial situation, the comparison between Enron and General Electric, how much of the Enron story is still hidden from the public, and what can be expected of the investigation in the coming months.
